

[letter regarding animal tracks from Hildburghausen]<sup>1</sup>

From the enormous [quarries] at Hildburghausen, we have read\* that they have taken natural stone footsteps. I myself possess a rock slab with such a thing. The form of the footsteps are as though they were raised up from hands<sup>2</sup>, as soft sandstone poured into a mold, and sandstone with a fine clay coating under it. The animal seems to me to be a moderately large marsupial mammal with thumbs on the rear and front feet. In the same quarry there are have also bone remains found, which can perhaps provide a better explanation. The history of the discovery was given on the recommendation of SICKLER in a letter written to BLUMENBACH. Since this animal is new, I name it *Chirotherium Barthii*; but if it is an amphibian, in contrast to what the trackway suggests, I will change the name to *Chirosaurus*.
